	of course work (in and out of class). Courses take place throughout the entire	
	semester (13 weeks) and/or in block seminars.	
LEARNING EXPECTATIONS		
	Seminars, lectures, self-study. Students are expected to attend all lectures, to	
	complete all course-related assignments and to take exams in order to receive a	
	course grade. Classes range in size from 20 to 300 students.
