The third meeting of the Transatlantic Theory Workshop will take place in Oxford from Tuesday morning 14 September through lunch on Thursday 16 September. There will be approximately 15 presentations and 25 participants drawn mainly from Northwestern, Paris, and Oxford. Not everyone is expected to present; the purpose of the workshop is to provide a forum for discussion of current research in game theory, decision theory, and their applications. Presentations will be limited to one hour in the interest of keeping plenty of time for informal conversation and relaxation.
